Crime: Data, Reporting, and Reducing

As it concerns crime within the City, we have experienced an overall average increase of 7% in crime when collectively considering homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft. (Figure 1.) As for crimes against persons, we have experienced decreases in homicide and rape and increases in robbery and assault. As for crimes against property, we have experienced decreases in burglary and larceny and increases motor vehicle theft. We are still experiencing problems with motor vehicle theft (43% increase) – many of which occur to people leaving their vehicles running, unlocked, and unattended.

Policing starts with you – the community. You are the heart of the policing mission and we require your involvement to increase the safety and security of our community. If you observe suspicious activity, a crime about to occur, or a crime in progress please call the police immediately so that the police department can investigate these matters quickly to prevent and stop crime. For non-emergency situations, call police dispatch at (636) 529-8210. For emergency situations, dial 911. Any resident who would like to host a Neighborhood Watch meeting in their area to discuss crime and other policing related matters and initiatives, please contact the police depart-

ment office during normal business hours, between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm, to make arrangements. The police department will have a police officer available to attend your meeting and we will help you with marketing your neighborhood meeting.

Body-Worn Cameras

The police department has finally unveiled and materialized all the work that has been done over the last couple of years in an effort to use federal grant



money to start a body-worn camera program. The \$435,304.00 initiative partnered 8 St. Louis area municipal police departments with the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the federal Training and Technical Assistance. The development and approval of police policies, officer training, and storage, access, and release of recordings were all developed and implemented under federally approved guidelines. In August 2020, the



program was formally launched. In October 2020, Chief Jeremy Ihler provided a body-worn camera public presentation and demonstration for our community. Its purpose was to educate the citizenry on the grant process, the realities of bodyworn cameras, and to engage in discussion and answer questions on issues sur-

rounding this type of technology and how it will be used in our community. The recording of the presentation can be found on the department's Facebook page. More information, including the federally approved police body-worn camera policy and procedures, can be found on the City's website.

Trends, Issues, & Problems

Have you ever been concerned with your safety when reporting crime to the police? Have you felt embarrassed to discuss an issue with a police officer? Do you want to better hide your identity when providing information to police that may lead to the arrest of a person? Remain anonymous and reduce your stress by using the T.I.P. Line! The "Trends, Issues, and Problems" email reporting system is for those who prefer to remain unknown while providing the police necessary information to maintain order and safety in our community. The T.I.P. Line can be used to relay information on reoccurring suspicious activity, neighborhood problems, derelict vehicles, and other issues that serve the goal of community problem-solving.

When providing information, please be as detailed as possible by including the following (as relevant):

- 1. Location of incident
- 2. Time of occurrence
- 3. Description of suspicious/illegal activity
- 4. Description of persons involved (height, weight, description of clothes, etc.)
- 5. Vehicle information including license plate
- 6. Any additional information that you feel will be helpful

If you choose to provide your name and phone number, a member of the police department may contact you to obtain additional information. Do not use the T.I.P. Line to report crimes in progress and other matters that require immediate police attention – call non-emergency dispatch or 911 as appropriate. We thank you for your assistance in helping us keep our community safe.

REMINDERS: Trash containers should be stored behind the front wall of your propety. Trash containers shouldn't be placed at the curb no earlier than 5pm on the day prior to your trash day and must be removed by 5pm on the day after collection. Grass should be no taller than 8 inches in height and grass clippings may not be left in the street.

Snow Routes

The street department does an amazing job keeping our streets open during snow events. The City of BN has passed ordinances to ensure sufficient space for emergency vehicles to serve residents and snow removal equipment to easily maneuver and clean streets efficiently. Ordinance #2096 was passed in 2008 to deem the following streets no parking:

- Addision, 1000 block
- Akron, 1400-1500 block
- Avant, 1000 block
- Comet Drive, between Ashbrook and Dwight
- Dwight, 10151
- Hamlet Court
- Kelvin Drive, cul-de-sac only
- Kimball Court
- Laire, 1100-1200 block
- Larue Court
- Southworth Court
- Surf, 10232, 10236
- Green Acres Road from Bellefontaine Road, generally westward to the "Y" intersection at lot # 47, including Orchard Court, Orchard Lane, Willow Court and Willow Lane

Residents and visitors should keep in mind that everyone should be aware of parking restrictions, especially during snow or ice events. Please take notice of the ordinances below and always leave enough room in the street so a snowplow or emergency vehicle can get through. These ordinances were passed in 1964 and are still in effect today.

Sec. 17-152. Standing or parking close to curb.

Except as otherwise provided in sections 17-153 through 17-155, every vehicle stopped or parked upon a roadway where there are adjacent curbs shall be so stopped or parked with the right-hand wheels of such vehicle parallel to and within eighteen (18) inches of the righthand curb.

Sec. 17-156. Parking not to obstruct traffic.

No person shall park any vehicle upon a street, other than an alley, in such a manner or under such conditions as to leave available less than ten (10) feet of the width of the roadway for free movement of vehicular traffic.

It was a process to obtain this licensure, and a lot of hard work was put in by your RFPD Firefighters to help take our district to the next level. When our citizens overwhelmingly passed the EMS tax increase, we planned to be ALS ready in 10 years. With some hard work and perseverance, we made it happen in just 4!!

What does ALS mean for our citizens? We will now carry more lifesaving medications and equipment.

When will RFPD begin providing ALS services? Our "go live" date is January 1, 2021. We are waiting for some additional equipment to come in, and some in-house training, and then we will be ready to go!

RIVERVIEW GARDENS SCHOOL DISTRICT AWARDED HOTSPOTS, LAPTOPS THROUGH GRANT

Riverview Gardens School District was awarded 2,621 WiFi hotspots and 750 Chromebooks from the Saint Louis County Library as a part of its Digital Equity Initiative. The initiative is a partnership between the Library, Saint Louis County and local school districts to provide hotspots and technology to support education.

The essential technology will provide crucial support to families and aid the District's virtual learning curriculum.

"We couldn't be more excited to have been a recipient of this technology grant from the St. Louis County Library," said Dr. Scott Spurgeon, superintendent of schools. "We are now able to level the playing field with greater access to WiFi and technology for our students."

The equipment was financed through a \$4 million designation of federal CARES Act funding by St. Louis County Executive Sam Page.

In a statement, St. Louis County Library Director Kristen Sorth said, "We are grateful to St. Louis County for their generous support in helping address digital equity in our region. Providing students with digital access will give them the tools they need to be successful..."

In addition to providing Riverview Gardens School District with technology, the Library also restarted Operation Food Search, a "drive-thru food pick-up for kids."

The service provides free, pre-packaged meals at select library locations, including the Lewis & Clark Branch, located at 9909 Lewis & Clark Blvd. The location sits across the street from the RGSD administration building.

"The St. Louis County Library system has and continues to be a tremendous resource not only for Riverview Gardens School District but for the St. Louis region and beyond," Spurgeon said.

The Library's efforts support the District's own. On Aug. 31, RGSD began delivering and distributing breakfast and lunch to students to support virtual instruction.

Additionally, Riverview Gardens School District purchased 1,126 hotspots, which are available for families at their local schools. The District also purchased 2,537 Chromebooks to distribute to students. The delivery of those Chromebooks has been delayed due to limited availability amid a staggering increase in global demand due to COVID-19.





Treasurer's Report

Re: Treasurer's Report - Summary

Current Key Notes:

- As of **October 2020**, the city held a total of \$3.5 million in funds at the local investment banks administered by the city treasurer, mayor and city clerk.
- Fifty percent of Cares Act Funds were received on 10/26 from STL County. (\$373,426.50)
- Remaining 50% schedule for 11/13 per final agreement. (\$746,853.00)
- The annual audit for fiscal year 2019-2020 started the last week of September. To date, there hasn't been any significant concerns brought up by the auditors.
- Revenue Notes:
 - To date, sales tax revenue is up by 12% than budgeted. Licenses, Fines & Rec Center revenue are down a combined average of 69%. Overall, current revenue is slightly above budget by less that 1% with the exception of the Cares Act Funds which puts the revenue rate above budget by 56%.
- Expense Notes: Expense allocations across departments and funds are still being reconciled and processed for October. To date, total expenses for the general fund are trending below budget by 7%.
 - Key drivers of this is payroll to be booked to capital fund (per budget) and MIRMA insurance higher than budgeted by 13%. In person services are still trending below budget due to the pandemic. Regis expenses are trending above budget and are being researched to determine source of increase and savings potential. Indirect expenses overall are below budget by 25%. This excludes payroll, insurance and employee related taxes.
- Overall Financial Health:
 - The city has solid liquidity to meet short-term obligations or those due within the current fiscal year, considering the recovery of loss revenue from the CARES Act funds.
