

To the Residents of Bellefontaine Neighbors,

Since taking office in March 2025, the City has accomplished the following:

- A Ways and Means Committee was created to help the City and Board with expenses, bids, and contracts. This is the first committee of its kind in the City, and it works to ensure that tax dollars are tracked and spent properly.
- The City worked with the Police Department and Union to correct previous payroll errors, including issues with payroll, miscalculated pay stubs, Kelly Days, and contributions to 401k and 457 retirement plans.
- City policy was reinstated to provide employees with secondary insurance coverage. This included reinstating a policy with AFLAC that had lapsed without notice, which provides up to \$1,000 in reimbursement to employees from the City.
- Several key positions have been filled, including an accountant, a city clerk, and a court clerk. Ordinances were also passed to establish the duties for these roles. A finance director and an assistant to the finance director were also hired.
- An experienced city attorney was hired at about half the cost of the previous counsel.
- The City worked with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources regarding underground storage tanks, which helped to avoid fines and secure the necessary insurance.
- After being notified that the City's insurance would not be renewed, the City appealed and successfully obtained city-wide liability, health, and workers' compensation insurance.
- The remaining ARPA funds were addressed with the Department of Treasury and placed into a separate escrow account.
- Over \$300,000 in illegally issued checks were found, along with all bank accounts, and the information was reported to the U.S. Attorney's Office and the St. Louis County Prosecutor.
- The City is currently working with the City Auditor to provide information and complete audits from 2022 to the present.

The first City budget since 2022 was passed.

The City is working with the Governor to receive \$275,000 from the Family Support Division to help families in need and the City's youth.

Staff has been trained and certified by North County Fire and Rescue in CPR and AED. Paycom time clocks have been installed and training is underway for all City Staff. This will streamline our current payroll system.





Please help us help you by keeping vehicles off streets during snow or ice storms. It could be you who needs help.










HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE **UPCOMING MONTHS**

Hopefully with these tips you can trim your electricity bill, save a few dollars, and make it through winter without any surprises.








Ward 3: Neighbors United, Community Ignited

COMMUNITY REMINDERS:

Keep Our City Clean and Compliant! Let's work together to keep our neighborhoods clean and follow city codes. Trash containers **should not be placed at the curb before 5:00 PM** the day *prior* to your scheduled pickup, and they must be **removed by 5:00 PM** *after* collection day.

Failure to follow these guidelines may result in citations and fines issued to the property owner or occupant.

- \$200 first violation
- \$275 second violation
- \$350 third violation
- \$450 fourth and subsequent violations

Street sweeping will take place this fall—but remember, the sweeper is not designed to collect leaves like a vacuum. To help ensure smooth operations and protect our infrastructure, please keep excess leaves out of the street.

Why It Matters Blocked sewers from leaf buildup can cause basement flooding and damage household appliances like water heaters, furnaces, and laundry machines. These costly issues are preventable with proper disposal of yard waste.

Yard Waste Disposal Tips

- Use the free 96-gallon carts provided by Waste Management
- Or use your own trash cans or biodegradable "kraft" paper yard bags No plastic bags!

Tree Trimming & Removal

The Public Works Department is responsible for maintaining all easement trees within city limits. Easement trees are those growing on City-managed streets or public rights of way—typically found between the sidewalk and the street.

Our team provides trimming services (i.e. removal of dead limbs) for these trees and will remove any that pose an immediate safety risk or are classified as public nuisances. We will not remove a tree unless it is classified as 50% dead. based on severity.

Please note: We do not service trees located on private property.

As your Interim Chief of Police, I want to ensure the safety and well-being of our community, especially during the approaching winter months when challenging weather conditions can pose unique risks. I am pleased to share some essential tips for winter driving and crime prevention.

Winter Driving Tips

Plan Ahead: Check weather forecasts and road conditions before heading out. Allow extra time for your commute and plan your route accordingly.

Vehicle Maintenance: Ensure your vehicle is winter-ready. Check your brakes, tires, battery, and fluids. Consider installing snow tires for added traction.

Drive Cautiously: Slow down and maintain a safe following distance. Roads can be slippery, and visibility may be reduced. Use your headlights even during the day.

Emergency Kit: Keep an emergency kit in your vehicle, including a blanket, non-perishable snacks, water, a flashlight, and a first aid kit.

<u> Home Security: Tips</u>

_Ensure your home is secure. Lock all doors and windows and consider installing motion-activated lights around the property.

Holiday Packages: If you are expecting packages, try to have them delivered to a secure location or ask a neighbor to collect them to prevent porch theft.

Travel Planss If you are planning to be away, let a trusted neighbor or friend know. They can keep an eye on your property and collect mail or newspapers to give the appearance that someone is home. Do not announce that you will be going on a trip on social media.

Vehicle Safety: Avoid leaving your vehicle running while unattended. Do not leave valuables in your vehicle, especially in plain sight. Lock your car doors, and park in well-lit areas.

Community Watch:

Stay connected with your neighbors and consider signing up with NextDoor.com, the 21st Century electronic neighborhood watch.

RGSD Information for Fall 2025

Dr. Joell Ramsdell joins RGSD as the district's Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction. Important Upcoming Changes for the 2025-2026 School Year No Cell Phones Allowed in the Classroom or at School Functions, It's the Law

Big changes are here for the 2025-26 school year. The State of Missouri has passed a new law banning cell phones from K-12 schools. The cell phone ban, Senate Bill No. 68, was signed into law by Gov. Mike Kehoe on July 9.

The law governs the possession and use of cellular phones on school property and during school events, as well as their use during instructional time, with certain exceptions made for emergencies and specific health needs and authorized educational use.

RGSD Adopt Clear Backpack Requirements Districtwide

The Riverview Gardens School District is implementing a new safety measure for the upcoming 2025-26 school year to enhance safety measures and strengthen security across all campuses. All scholars in grades pre-kindergarten through 12th grade will be required to use clear backpacks.

The new policy is part of ongoing efforts to provide a safe environment for scholars and staff. The clear backpack policy will apply to all district schools, including the early childhood center, elementary schools, middle schools and the Riverview Gardens High School.

New Security Measures Implemented for 2025-2026 School Year

In addition to the clear backpack requirements and no cell phone requirement, RGSD has implemented the following measures to help ensure that RGSD is a safe learning environment:

Metal detectors are in use for all scholars and visitors at every school and Central Services Secure entry vestibules constructed in 12 schools

A valid Photo ID is required for all adult visitors to gain entry into the school

chance to sign an attendance pledge stating they will try to achieve 85% or better attendance for the 2025-2026 school year. We had approximately 100 students sign our pledge. We enjoy working with the students, parents and school district faculty to make this happen
